

Procedures for Grant Administration Reporting

1. Describe the methodology that is used to determine how trips are charged to each funding source or grant.

The RouteMatch software being used to schedule and route demand response trips allows the Sussex County Skylands Ride to code each new customer according to the funding source for their trips, e.g., a resident of Vernon going to the Vernon nutrition site is coded Vernon. The intake staff taking basic new customer information will determine with the customer if they are covered by a specific funding stream.

The Section 5311 grant is used to fund the demand response service when the pick-up or drop-off location is rural. Specific customer demand response trips are tied to certain funding streams by the customer characteristics. However, individual trips may be charged to different funding streams depending on the characteristics for the customer, the trip purpose, or the trip pick-up/drop-off location.

SECTION II - DESCRIPTION OF SERVICE

Service Description

1. Describe any changes that were made (days, hours of operations) in 2016.

SCDRTAP: No operational changes were made in 2016.

Section 5311: No operational changes were made in 2016.

SCDRTAP: Sussex County transportation services are provided Monday through Friday from 4:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. and Saturday Transportation services are provided on the Connect route from 8:20 a.m. to 3:40 p.m.

Sussex County Skylands Ride provides demand-response transportation, called Skylands by Request, for senior citizens and people with disabilities connecting individuals with doctors and hospitals both in-county and out-of-county. Newton is a major transportation destination because of medical services in close proximity to Newton Medical Center. There are many doctors and other medical facilities in the Newton area, including dialysis services. Other common in-county sites are the shopping areas located in Newton, Franklin and Sussex/Wantage. The Sussex/Wantage shopping site is the A&P Plaza, and the Branchville/Montague area includes Tri-County Plaza in Montague. Transportation is also provided to nutrition sites in Franklin, Newton and Vernon. Out-of-county transportation is provided for non-emergency medical service, many of which are not available within Sussex County. These include transporting individuals to dialysis and other medical services in Dover, Denville, Morristown and to veterans' facilities in both northern New Jersey and in New York State.

Several senior and low income housing complexes as well as the county's long term care facility are major population centers for transportation requests.

Section 5311: Sussex County transportation services are provided Monday through Friday from 4:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. and Saturday Transportation services are provided on the Connect route from 8:20 a.m. to 3:40 p.m. S5311 funding is utilized for demand response in designated municipalities. The townships served are rural: Frankford, Lafayette, Montague, Ogdensburg, Sandyston, Sparta, Sussex, Vernon and Wantage.

In planning public transportation services, private sector providers must be given an opportunity to express their views. How does the subrecipient allow for input on services from private operators in the service area?

The Sussex County Transportation Citizens Advisory Committee holds an annual public hearing at the Sussex County Community College. Notice of the hearing is made public in the New Jersey Herald and New Jersey Star Ledger at least 30 days in advance. Notice is also filed with Jeff Parrott, County Clerk and Catherine Williams, Clerk of the Board of Chosen Freeholders as well was with clerks in the county's municipalities. The draft applications are made available at the County Main Library or may be viewed upon request. Input for the plan may be submitted prior to the hearing date in writing or orally during the hearing.

Service Operations

Reservations are accepted Monday through Friday from 5:00 am to 6:00 pm at (973) 579-0480.

b. What is the minimum and maximum amount of time needed to reserve a trip?

The guidelines state no less than 48 hours' notice and no more than 7 days in advance as the preferred and advertised time frame, although the Sussex County Skylands Ride does accept standing orders, and will make other exceptions to these guidelines, if it is possible to accommodate the request.

c. Will you accept a same-day reservation?

The guidelines for reservations do not allow for any trip requests for less than 48 hours' notice, however, Skylands Ride will make exceptions to these guidelines, if it is possible to accommodate the request. Same day trips are assigned as unscheduled in the computer system and every attempt is made to fit them into the daily schedule.

d. What is your agency's available hours for open appointments other than subscription trip? (For example, limited capacity from 7-10am and 3-5pm due to nutrition and/or non-competitive employment).

There are available hours for open appointments other than subscription trips during set days of the week, times, and locations of Sussex County on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

e. Do you maintain a customer profile? If yes, what information is contained in this profile?

Yes. The customer profile includes customer name and address, phone number, e-mail address, gender, birth date, primary language, disability type, emergency contact information, special directions and whether or not an attendant is required.

f. How is customer eligibility verified for SCDRTAP?

Eligibility verification is done through self-disclosure by the customer with a disability. Age is checked via dates of birth for senior citizens. Address is requested for all customers to verify that they are Sussex County residents.

g. How is a trip identified as Section 5311 eligible?

All Skylands Connect service stops in rural areas, therefore passengers boarding the Skylands Connect are S5311 eligible. For the few demand response trips charged to S5311, address is requested for all customers to verify that they are Sussex County residents living in rural townships and that the customer will be traveling within rural townships in Sussex County.

Skylands Ride uses a mobile data tablet and AVL to transmit driver manifests and collect information about passenger pick-ups and drop-offs times. IVR system will be installed and utilized to contact customers reminding them of an upcoming ride, pick-up time and telling the customer the bus is 5 minutes away from pick-up. IVR will be used to communicate major service changes such as weather related service cancellation.

The areas to be serviced by SCDRTAP funding are all of Sussex County, Denville, Dover Chester and Morristown, Morris County and UMDNJ, Newark Essex County. SCDRTAP fund some trips for elderly veterans to Castle Point, NY, Lyons, Bernardsville Somerset county and East Orange, Essex County. Skylands on-Request (demand response paratransit) connects to both the Skylands Connect, the public bus route, and the New Freedom service which runs down the Route 206 corridor from Newton to the Netcong Transit Village which connects to NJT service and the Morris County M.O.M Shuttle.

S5311 service will provide the bus service in the rural areas of Sussex County. The service operates Monday through Friday from 4:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. The townships served are Frankford, Lafayette, Montague, Ogdensburg, Sandyston, Sparta, Sussex, Vernon, and Wantage.



County of Sussex Department of Human Services Division of Social Services Service Agreement

WHEREAS, the County of Sussex (hereinafter the County) operates a coordinated, countywide transportation system and desires to improve paratransit service coverage to the outlying areas of its geographic boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Vernon (hereinafter the Township) desires transportation for its senior citizens and persons with disabilities.

NOW, THEREFORE, in the consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions herein contained, the parties hereto covenant and agree to the following provisions:

- 1. This Agreement shall be in effect beginning January 1, 2016 for calendar years 2016, 2017 and 2018.
- This Agreement replaces all prior Agreements regarding paratransit services between the parties.
- 3. The Township agrees to provide funds in the amount not to exceed \$50,000.00 per year. The cost per one-way passenger trip for 2016 is set at \$16.00. Prices and services for 2017 and 2018 will be negotiated annually and set by the County 60 days prior to the end of the year. Payment represents a portion of the costs associated with this service. The balance is subsidized by grant funds received by the County.

The Township shall have an option to renew this Agreement for three-year increments, but in no event shall any Agreement renewals be effective after December 31, 2018. Payments during the renewal terms shall be \$50,000.00 per annum, so long as the County receives state grant funds to cover the balance of the costs of the services provided. If the state grant funding is reduced or eliminated or there is a change in the scope of the service, the services and price per trip will have to be modified to reflect the reduction in income or the Township share can increase in order to maintain the level of service. The options must be exercised in writing 90 days prior to the termination of any contract period.

The County will invoice the Township monthly for services provided. A service report listing the trips provided for the month will be attached to the invoice. The trip listing will include the name and address of the passenger. The names and addresses of the passengers will be provided after the County informs the passengers that this information is being released to the Township.

Payments shall be made monthly. The payments set forth represent the Township's Maintenance of Effort (MOE) certification under the New Jersey Senior Citizen and Disabled Resident Transportation Assistance Program (SCADRTAP).

- 4. The cost of out of county trips for medical appointments shall be borne by the County. The overtime costs associated with special event trips, both in and out of county, shall be borne by the Township. The Township Manager or designee must pre-approve all overtime charges.
- The Township will be billed \$16.00 for no-shows if a customer has three no-shows within 90 days (failure to board the vehicle after it has arrived). All customers are notified by the County after their second no-show in 90 days.

The Township will be billed \$16.00 for cancellations if the customer has six cancellations in one month (failure to notify the County one day in advance of the cancellation). All customers are notified by the County after their fifth cancellation in one month.

Whenever any customer is sent either a no-show or cancellation notice by the County, the Township will also be notified by email.

Weather-related cancellations do not count toward the total number of cancellations.

- The County is responsible for all costs associated with the provision
 of this service, including but not limited to, drivers, vehicles,
 administration, insurance, maintenance, fuel, and radio
 communications.
- 7. The County will develop all routing and scheduling based upon information supplied by the Township. Any revisions to the service delivery system will be arranged in writing by the Township Manager or designated representative and the County Director of Social Services or designated representative.
- The service will operate Monday through Friday, depending on the trip request load and pattern. No service will be provided on County holidays. Additionally, the County reserves the right to cancel service due to inclement weather. Cancellations will be broadcast on radio stations WNNJ and WSUS.

The scope of service is defined as follows:

Local Errand Transportation (in county) Nutrition sites Shopping Medical appointments Banking Community services

Out of County (non-emergency medical appointments)
Doctors, hospitals, clinics including Morris County (as
far as the Dover and Morristown area) on Monday,

The Skylands Ride Program Coordinator and Supervisors can deny service to any person who is, in the opinion of Skylands Ride staff, disruptive and/or a danger to themselves and/or others or property. The Township will be notified of all such service denials for disruptive behavior in writing. Similarly, the County agrees to advise the Township in writing of any incidents involving Township clients.
- This Agreement may be canceled by either party by providing ninety (90) days written notice.

WHEREAS, the Township of Hardyston (hereinafter the Township) is desirous of securing transportation for its senior citizens and persons with disabilities.

NOW, THEREFORE, in the consideration of the mutual convenants and conditions herein contained, the parties hereto convenant and agree to the following provisions:

- This Agreement shall be in effect beginning January 1, 2016 and terminating on December 31, 2016.
- 2. This Agreement replaces all prior Agreements regarding paratransit services between the parties.
- 3. The Township agrees to provide funds in the amount not to exceed \$17,000.00 for 2016. The County will provide rides to the Township at a rate of \$16.00 per passenger trip (one, one way trip) during 2016. Payment represents a portion of the costs associated with this service. The balance is subsidized by grant funds received by the County.

If the grant funding is reduced or eliminated, the services will be modified to reflect the reduction in income or the Township share can increase in order to maintain the level of service. The options must be exercised in writing 90 days prior to the termination of any contract period.

Payments shall be made monthly. The payments set forth represent the Township's Maintenance of Effort (MOE) certification under the New Jersey Senior Citizen and Disabled Resident Transportation Assistance Program (SCADRTAP).

4. The Township will be billed \$16.00 for no-shows if a customer has three no-shows within 90 days (failure to board the vehicle after it has arrived). All customers are notified by the County after their second no-show in 90 days.

The Township will be billed \$16.00 for cancellations if the customer has six cancellations in one month (failure to notify the County one day in

advance of the cancellation). All customers are notified by the County after their fifth cancellation in one month.

Weather-related cancellations do not count toward the total number of cancellations.

- The County is responsible for all costs associated with the provision of this service, including but not limited to, drivers, vehicles, administration, insurance, maintenance, fuel, and radio communications through grant funds.
- 6. The County will develop all routing and scheduling based upon information supplied by the Township. Any revisions to the service delivery system (established under the predecessor Agreement) will be arranged in writing by the Township Manager or designated representative and the County Transit Director or designated representative. The County will explore new marketing tools with the Township in an effort to improve program awareness.
- 7. The intent of this Agreement is to provide transportation to eligible Township residents Monday through Friday. All trip requests from Township residents will be honored provided that proper scheduling procedures (i.e. calls are received by cut-off time) are followed. The service will operate over an 8 to 10 hour day, depending on the trip request load and pattern. No service will be provided on County holidays. Additionally, the County reserves the right to cancel service due to inclement weather. Cancellations will be broadcast on radio stations WNNJ and WSUS.
- 8. The scope of services outlined below will serve as a suggested guide of trip purposes:

Medical appointments

Community services

- 9. The full range of paratransit services will be available to the eligible residents of the jurisdiction as described in the Sussex County Transit brochures attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement. paragraph number one.

This AGREEMENT, is by and between the Sussex County Board of Chosen Freeholders on behalf of the Sussex County Division of Senior Services, hereinafter referred to as the "County", and Sussex County Office of Transit/Skylands Ride, One Spring Street, Newton, New Jersey, 07860, hereinafter referred to as the "Grantee".

WITNESSETH THAT:

- 1. <u>Term of Agreement</u>. This Agreement shall be effective as of the 1st day of January, 2016 and shall terminate no later than the 31st day of December, 2016.
- 2. <u>Compliance.</u> The Grantee agrees that it shall comply with all provisions of the authorizing appropriation, the Act, and any regulations requirements or guidelines which the County may issue, whether explicitly referred to herein or not. It is further agreed that the Grantee shall seek and develop its own source of funding in anticipation of the expiration of this Grant. In no event shall this Grant be construed as a commitment by the County to expend funds beyond the termination date set forth in Paragraph 1.
- 3. <u>Subcontracts.</u> In accepting this contract, the Recipient shall include the following provisions in sub-contracts, with any subcontractor or third party that utilizes Area Plan funding under this contract. An AAA subcontractor, or third party, utilizing Area Plan funding shall comply with all federal, State, and local laws related to the Older Americans Act.

- 4. <u>First Amendment Compliance.</u> Funds provided under this contract shall not be utilized in a manner, which would contravene the Establishment Clause of the First Amendment of the United States Constitution. Specifically, these conditions are as follows:
 - a) In no event shall the provision of the services to be funded under this agreement be conditioned upon attendance at or participation in religious programs, services, or activities;
 - b) Any services to be provided under this agreement shall be essentially secular in nature and scope and in no event shall there be any religious services, counseling, proselytizing, instruction, or other religious influence undertaken in connection with the provision of such services; and
 - c) Funds provided under this contract shall not be used for the construction, rehabilitation, or restoration of any facility owned by a religious organization and used, now or in the future, for any religious activity or purpose.
- 5. <u>Focal Points.</u> Identify, when feasible, a focal point for comprehensive service delivery.
- 6. <u>Funding Disclosure.</u> Grantee shall disclose all sources and expenditure of funds such agency receives or expends to provide services to older individuals to the State Unit on Aging or the Commissioner for the Department of Human Services upon request.
- 7. Other Funds. The Grantee shall not use funds provided under this Agreement to replace existing or committed financial support for the same project, except as may be provided by this Agreement or with the express written approval of the County.
- 8. <u>Scope of Services</u> In consideration of the Grant provided by this Agreement, the Grantee shall, in a satisfactory and proper manner as determined by the County, perform all services specified in Attachment "A".
- 9. Compensation. The County shall provide to the Grantee a sum not to exceed \$56,729.00 supplemented by \$1,500.00 in Project Income. The Grantee shall expend project funds in accordance with the Approved Budget as set forth on Attachment B, the amounts expended for the Personnel and Consultants which shall not have been expended in accordance with Attachment B shall be credited against and deducted from the total compensation to be paid to the Grantee under this Agreement. Except as shall be more specifically limited on Attachment B, the amounts expended for each of the major cost categories listed on Attachment B may not exceed the approved amount by more than 10% or \$500.00 whichever is greater provided, however, that the total Approved Budget is not exceeded. The express prior written approval of the Administrator, Sussex County Department of Human Services, is necessary to amend any budget category.

- 10. Method of Payment. The County shall make payments under this Agreement upon the submission of a properly executed Sussex County Official Voucher together with such other documentation as may be required. The manner and form of such submission shall be in accordance with the procedures described on Attachment C, and detailed reimbursement request.
- 11. <u>Books and Records.</u> The Grantee shall maintain such records and accounts as are deemed necessary by the County to assure a proper accounting for all project funds, County of Sussex, State of New Jersey and non-state shares. These records shall be available for audit and examination by any governmental agency having an interest in the project. The County shall have the right to conduct said audit or examination at any time during the regular working hours of this project. Said records shall be retained for five (5) years after expiration of this Agreement, unless the County, in writing, specifically waives such requirement. The Grantee hereby acknowledges that the County shall carry out such monitoring and evaluation activities as it shall, from time to time, require for proper administration and performance of the Agreement.
- 12. Reports and Submissions. The Grantees shall submit such reports relating to the activities and the finances of the project as shall be required by the County. The required reports shall be in the form specified on Attachment C. Grantee shall submit a final report within 15 days after the contract period.
- 13. <u>Travel Expenses.</u> The Grantee, if a public agency, shall charge expenses for travel in accordance with the customary practice in the government of which the agency is a part. If the Grantee is a private Agency, expenses charged for travel shall not exceed those allowable under the State of New Jersey Travel Regulations. In any event, travel expenses shall not be charged in excess of the allowable budget amount.
- 14. <u>Personal Property.</u> If personal property, including equipment, costing less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per item is acquired and used for three (3) years from date of acquisition for approved contract purposes, title to such property shall vest in the Grantee. Personal property, including equipment, costing more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or used for less than three (3) years shall be owned by the County. The County, at its option, may, however, permit the Grantee to retain such property, subject to the reimbursement to the County of its cost minus a fair rental value for the period of actual use.
- 15. <u>Unexpended Fund Balances.</u> The Grantee may incur costs only during the period set forth in paragraph number 1 of this Agreement. Expenditures made before or after these dates shall be disallowed. Funds obligated, but not disbursed at the end of the contract period, shall be liquidated within thirty (30) days after the close of the contract period and any unexpended fund balance remaining shall be returned to the County with the submission of the final report. The County, at its discretion, may authorize the Grantee to use the unexpended grant funds:

- a. for approved grant purposes after the end of the contract period if the project is continuing activity and the County intends to enter into another agreement for a period. Under such circumstances, the amount of the subsequent grant shall be reduced by the amount of the unexpended funds remaining at the end of the previous contract period.
- b. for approved grant purposes, if the County authorizes an extension of the contract period.

In no event shall the Grantee use unexpended funds after the contract period without the expressed written approval of the County.

- 16. <u>Changes</u>. The County may, from time to time, request changes in the scope of services of the Grantee to be performed hereunder. Such changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of the Grantee's compensation, which are mutually agreed upon by and between the County and Grantee, must be incorporated in written amendments to this Agreement, and be approved by the Administrator of the Sussex County Department of Human Services.
- 17. <u>Assignability.</u> The Grantee shall not subcontract any of the work or services covered by this Agreement, nor shall any interest in this Agreement be assigned or transferred, except as may be provided within the terms of this County, and the Administrator of the Sussex County Department of Human Services.
- 18. <u>Discrimination Prohibited.</u> The Grantee shall not discriminate in the performance of this Agreement because of sex, race, creed, or nation origin. The Grantee agrees to comply with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.
- 19. Availability of Funds. The parties hereto recognize that the Grant Agreement, made on behalf of the County, is dependent upon such funding appropriations as may be made by the State of New Jersey, the Federal Government, the County of Sussex or other funding sources; the County shall not be held liable for any breach of this Agreement because of the absence available funding appropriations.
- 20. <u>Termination</u>. The County may, by giving written notice to the Grantee specifying the effective date, terminate this Agreement in whole or in part for any cause, which shall include but not be limited to:
 - Utilization of any portion of the appropriation hereunder to employ or otherwise compensate any person employed by the Division of Senior Services who has directly participated in the negotiation or approval of this Agreement;
 - b. Discovery of any pecuniary or personal interest by the Grantee, its employees, its officers, its trustees, or its directors in the project, or in any contract emanating from the operation of this project;

- c. Failure, for any reason, of the Grantee to satisfy its obligation under this Agreement;
- Submission by the Grantee to the County of reports that are incorrect or incomplete in any material respect;
- e. Any improper or inefficient use of funds, provided under this Agreement;
- f. Failure of the Grantee to permit the County to make an inspection of the administrative or operation facilities of the project;
- g. Conduct or acts of the Grantee and/or its staff which are detrimental to the objectives of this project;
- h. Any violation of the New Jersey Conflicts of Interest Law, N.J.S.A. 52:13D-12 et seq.;
- i. Failure to incorporate into grantees Personnel Policies and Procedures a system of full disclosure of all employees and applicants for employment who have been convicted of a crime.

Upon termination of this Agreement, the Grantee shall forthwith return all proceeds of the grant to the County within thirty (30) days.

21. <u>Insurance.</u> The Grantee does hereby represent that it presently maintains a policy of Liability Insurance in an amount not less than \$1,000,000.00 total arising from any one injury, which policy will cover all services the Grantee will provide under the terms of this Agreement. The Grantee further represents that it shall maintain said policy in full force and effect at all times during the term of this Agreement and shall indemnify and hold harmless the County of Sussex and the Division of Senior Services from any and all claims and damages, including attorneys fees, resulting from the performance of said services. The Grantee shall be obligated to see that a copy of the Liability Insurance Policy currently in force is on file with the Sussex County Department of Human Services at all times. The Grantee agrees to name the County of Sussex as an additional insured on its Liability Insurance Policy and will provide the County of Sussex with a Certificate of Insurance naming the County as an additional insured.

SUPPLEMENTARY PROVISION (Provisions Numbered 22 and following)

- 22. The Project Director shall maintain a liaison with the County of Sussex Division of Senior Services.
- 23. There shall be no requirements to be met by the elderly client and/or participant (any person 60 years of age or over) as a prerequisite to receiving the services of the project.
- 24. All vehicles operated by the project shall be in accordance with the New Jersey State Motor Vehicle Laws and operated by persons who:
 - a. possess a valid New Jersey Drivers License, and
 - b. are free from any impairing illness or disability.
- 25. A sign shall be prominently displayed on all vehicles and in all facilities operated or conjugation with the project stating that the project is funded under Title III of the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended, through a grant by the Sussex County Division of Senior Services.
- 26. In like manner, a notation of the above shall appear on all stationery, publications and public information relating to the project and its scope of services.
- 27. The following regulations concerning publication shall be adhered to by the Grantee:
 - a. Any books, reports, pamphlets, papers, or articles receiving support under Title III must contain an acknowledgment of that support.
 - b. A copy of the book, reports, pamphlets, papers, or articles must be filed with the Director of the Division of Senior Services, County of Sussex, prior to publication.
 - c. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Administration on Aging, (hereinafter call AOA) reserves the option to receive free of charge up to 12 copies of any publication published as part of a Title III project, and 2 copies of any publication based on project activities.
 - d. Where a project results in a book or other copyrightable material, the author is free to obtain a copyright, but AOA reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, or authorize other to use, all such material.
- 28. Quarterly and statistical reports shall be due every three months of the project period.

- 29. The Grantee must enter all client information into the automated reporting system (SAM's) for documenting and reporting purposes.
- 30. Any amendments to this contract can be executed between the Sussex County Division of Senior Services and the Grantee, after review and approval by the Board of Chosen Freeholders, and the Administrator, Sussex County Department of Human Services. Such amendments will be forwarded to the Sussex County Board of Chosen Freeholders after signature by the Grantee and the Sussex County Division of Senior Services.
- 31. The Grantee shall reinvest all income derived from the program.
- 32. An audit will be conducted of the Title III programs by the County of Sussex.
- 33. The Grantee shall comply with the rules of the Sussex County Division of Senior Services Operation Manual concerning Subgrantees.
- 34. The Grantee shall submit any required quarterly reports within nine (9) days of the last day of the quarter. Failure to file reports will result in withholding of payments.
- 35. The Grantee shall submit a summary of client satisfaction surveys to the Division of Senior Services at least once per year.
- 36. The Grantee shall be represented at the Mandatory Quarterly Grantee Meetings as established and planned by the Division of Senior Services.
- 37. The Grantee shall establish and post a Grievance Procedure in their respective agency, in accordance with guidelines established by the New Jersey Department of Human Services, Division of Aging Services, and the Division of Senior Services. The Grievance Procedure established by the Division of Senior Services is also required to be posted in their respective agency.
- 38. The Grantee shall submit a copy of its annual independent fiscal audit to the Sussex County Division of Senior Services.
- 39. The Grantee shall submit information related to clients served through the Agreement either by name, case number or a unique identification code when requested by the Sussex County Division of Senior Services.
- 40. The Grantee must have an Emergency Preparedness Plan and guide to use in the event of an emergency

41. In the event the Grantee does not perform any of the services, obligations, or responsibilities provided for under this contract, or in the event that the program or service does not attain the objectives as originally proposed or as set forth in this agreement to the satisfaction of the County, then the County may withhold all, or a portion of, any payment to be made under this Agreement, and in addition, may declare this contract null and void. In the event of termination, the County will have no further liability to the Grantee and in no event will the County be liable to pay for services not actually rendered.

COUNTY OF SUSSEX DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES

This CONTRACT is effective as of the date recorded on the signature page between the County of Sussex and Sussex County Office of Transit/Skyland's Ride hereafter identified as the Provider Agency.

WHEREAS, the County of Sussex (the County) has been duly designated under the authority of N.J.S.A. 30:1A-1, 30:1-11, and 30:1-20 to administer or supervise the administration of social service and training programs and has, in turn, designated the County to be directly responsible for the funding, implementation and administration of certain social service and training programs, including the program(s) covered by this Contract; and

WHEREAS, the County desires that the Provider Agency provide services and the Provider Agency has agreed to provide services in accordance with the terms and conditions contained in this Contract;

THEREFORE the County and the Provider Agency agree as follows:

I. DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of this document, the following terms, when capitalized, shall have meanings as stated:

<u>Annex(es)</u> means the attachment(s) to this document containing programmatic and financial information.

Contract means this document, the Annex(es), any additional appendices or attachments (including any approved assignments, subcontracts or modifications) and all supporting documents. The Contract constitutes the entire agreement between the parties.

<u>Notice</u> means an official written communication between the County and the Provider Agency. All Notices shall be delivered and directed to the persons and addresses specified for such purpose in the Annex(es) or to such other persons as either party may designate in writing.

<u>Termination</u> means an official cessation of this Contract, resulting either from routine expiration or from action taken by the County or the Provider Agency, in accordance with provisions contained in this Contract, to nullify the Contract prior to term.

II. BASIC OBLIGATIONS OF THE COUNTY

Section 2.01 Payment. As established in the Annex(es), payment for Contract services delivered shall be based on allowable expenditures or the specified rate per unit of service delivered. Such payment(s) shall be authorized by the County in accordance with the time frames specified in the Annex(es). Total payments shall not exceed the maximum Contract amount, if any specified in the Annex(es). All payments authorized by the County under this Contract shall be subject to revision on the basis of an audit or audits conducted under Section 3.07 Audit or on the basis of a County monitoring or evaluation of the Contract.

Section 2.02 Referenced materials. Upon written request of the Provider Agency, the County shall make available to the Provider Agency copies of federal and State regulations and other material specifically referenced in this document.

III. BASIC OBLIGATIONS OF THE PROVIDER AGENCY

<u>Section 3.01 Contract Services.</u> The Provider Agency shall provide services to eligible persons in accordance with all specifications contained in this contract.

<u>Section 3.02 Reporting.</u> The Provider Agency shall submit to the County programmatic and financial reports on forms provided by the County. The reporting frequency and due date(s) are specified and sample forms to be used are included in the Annex(es).

Section 3.03 Compliance with Laws. The Provider Agency agrees in the performance of this Contract to comply with all applicable federal, State and local laws, rules and regulations (collectively, "laws"), including but not limited to the following: State and local laws relating to licensure; federal and State laws relating to safeguarding of client information; the federal Civil Rights Act of 1964 (as amended); P.L. 1975, chapter 127, of the State of New Jersey (N.J.S.A. 10:5-31 et seq.) and associated executive order pertaining to affirmative action and nondiscrimination in public contracts; the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Act; Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 pertaining to non-discrimination on the basis of handicap, and regulations there under. Failure to comply with the laws, rules and regulations referenced above shall be grounds to terminate this Contract.

If any provision of this Contract shall conflict with any federal or State law(s) or shall have the effect of causing the County to be ineligible for federal financial participation in payment for Contract services, the specific Contract provision shall be considered amended or nullified to conform to such law(s). All other Contract provisions shall remain unchanged and shall continue in full force and effect.

Section 3.04 Affirmative Action.

Section 3.05 County Policies and Procedures. In the administration of this Contract, the Provider Agency shall comply with all applicable policies and procedures issued by the County, including, but not limited to, the policies and procedures contained in the State's Contract Reimbursement Manual (as from time to time amended) and the State's Contract Policy and Information Manual (as from time to time amended). Failure to comply with these policies and procedures shall be grounds to terminate this Contract.

<u>Section 3.06 Financial Management System.</u> The Provider Agency's financial management system shall provide for the following:

- accurate, current and complete disclosure of the financial results of this Contract and any other contract, grant, program or other activity administered by the Provider Agency;
- (b) records adequately identifying the source and application of all Provider Agency funds and all funds administered by the Provider Agency. These records shall contain information pertaining to all contract and grant awards, authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, liabilities, outlays and income;
- (c) effective internal and accounting controls over all funds, property and other assets. The Provider Agency shall adequately safeguard all such assets and shall ensure that they are used solely for authorized purposes;
- (d) comparison of actual outlays with budgeted amounts for this Contract and for any other contract, grant, program or other activity administered by the Provider Agency;
- (e) accounting records supported by source documentation;
- (f) procedures to minimize elapsed time between any advance payment issued and the disbursement of such advance funds by the Provider Agency;
- (g) procedures consistent with the provisions of any applicable county policies and procedures for determining the reasonableness, allowability and allocability of costs under the contract.

<u>Section 3.07 Audit.</u> At any time during the Contract term, the Provider Agency's overall operations, its compliance with specific Contract provisions, and the operations of any assignees or subcontractors engaged by the Provider Agency under <u>Section 5.02 Assignment and Subcontracts</u> may be subject to audit by the County, by any other

appropriate unit or agency of State or federal government, and/or by a private firm or firms retained or approved by the County for such purpose.

Whether or not such audits are conducted during the Contract term, a final financial and compliance audit of Contract operations, including the relevant operations of any assignees or subcontractors, may be conducted after Contract Termination. The Provider Agency is subject to audit up to four years after Termination of the Contract. If any audit has been begun but not completed or resolved before the end of the four year period, the Provider Agency continues to be subject to such audit until it is completed and resolved.

The County may require submission of the Provider Agency's annual organization-wide audit.

Audits shall be conducted in accordance with general accepted auditing standards as specified in the <u>Statements on Auditing Standards</u> as specified by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and <u>Government Auditing Standards</u> issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Section 3.08 Business Registration. N.J.S.A. 52:32-44 imposes the following requirements on contractors and all subcontractors that knowingly provide goods or perform services for a contractor fulfilling this contract: 1) the contractor shall provide written notice to its subcontractors to submit proof of business registration to the contractor; 2) prior to receipt of final payment from a contracting agency, a contractor must submit to the contracting agency an accurate list of all subcontractors or attest that none was used; 3) during the term of this contract, the contractor and its affiliates shall collect and remit, and shall notify all subcontractors and their affiliates that they must collect and remit to the Director, New Jersey Division of Taxation, the use tax due pursuant to the Sales and Use Tax Act, (N.J.S.A. 54:32B-1 et seq.) on all sales of tangible personal property delivered into this State.

A contractor, subcontractor or supplier who fails to provide proof of business registration or provides false business registration information shall be liable to a penalty of \$25.00 for each day of violation, not to exceed \$50,000.00 for each business registration not properly provided or maintained under a contract with a contracting agency. Information on the law and its requirements is available by calling (609) 292-9292.

IV. TERMINATION

Section 4.01 Termination by Provider Agency. The Provider Agency may terminate this Contract upon 60 calendar days' advance Notice to the County. If the Contract is terminated under this section, the Provider Agency shall settle all accounts with the County in the manner specified by the County and shall be subject to a final audit under Section 3.07 Audit.

Section 4.02 Termination for Cause. If the Provider Agency is not or has not

been in compliance with any provision(s) of this Contract, the County may, by Notice, place the Provider Agency in default of the Contract and, in accordance with County policy and procedures, may reduce Contract funding or terminate the Contract.

Section 4.03 Reduction or Termination Due to Fiscal Constraints. Anything to the contrary in this Contract notwithstanding, the parties recognize and agree that the County's ability to honor the terms and conditions of this Contract is contingent upon receipt of federal funds and/or appropriations of the State Legislature. If during the term of this Contract, therefore, the federal and/or the State government reduces its allocation to the County, the County reserves the right, upon Notice to the Provider Agency, to reduce or terminate the Contract.

V. MISCELLANEOUS

<u>Section 5.01 Application of New Jersey Law.</u> This Contract shall be governed, construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of New Jersey including the New Jersey Contractual Liability Act (N.J.S.A. 59:13-1 et seq.).

Section 5.02 Assignment and subcontracts. This Contract may not be assigned by the Provider Agency, in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of the County. Such consent, if granted, shall not relieve the Provider Agency of its responsibilities under the Contract. All approved assignments and subcontracts shall become part of this contract, and the Provider Agency shall bear full responsibility, without recourse to the State (including the County), for their performance. The Provider Agency shall forward copies of all assignment and subcontract documents to the County and shall retain copies of them on file together with this Contract.

Section 5.03 Client Fees. Other than as provided for in the Annex(es), the Provider Agency shall impose no fees or charges of any kind upon recipients of Contract services.

Section 5.04 Insurance. The Provider Agency shall maintain adequate insurance coverage. The County shall be included as an additional named insured on any insurance policy applicable to this Contract. Should the Provider Agency fail to pay any premium on any insurance policy when due, the County may pay the premium and, upon Notice to the Provider Agency, reduce payment to the Provider Agency by the amount of the premium payment.

Section 5.05 Indemnification. The Provider Agency shall defend, indemnify and otherwise save harmless the County, its agencies, departments, bureaus, boards, officials and employees from any and all claims or actions at law, whether for personal injury, property damage or liabilities, including the costs of defense (a) which arise from acts or omissions, whether negligent or not, of the Provider Agency or its agents, employees, servants, subcontractors, material suppliers or others working for the Provider Agency, irrespective of whether such risks are within or beyond the control of the Provider Agency, or (b) which arise from any failure to performance.

Notwithstanding the Provider Agency's responsibilities outlined above in this section, the County reserves the right to provide its own attorney(s) to assist in the defense of any legal actions which may arise as a result of this Contract.

Section 5.06 Statement of Non-Influence. No person employed by the County has been or will be paid any fee, commission, or compensation of any kind or granted any gratuity by the Provider Agency or any representative thereof in order to influence the awarding or administration of this Contract.

<u>Section 5.07 Exercise of Rights.</u> A failure or a delay on the part of the County or the Provider Agency in exercising any right, power or privilege under this Contract shall not waive that right, power or privilege. Moreover, a single or a partial exercise shall not prevent another or a further exercise of that or of any other right, power or privilege.

Section 5.08 Sufficiency of Funds. The provider Agency agrees that this Contract is contingent upon availability of appropriated funding and fulfillment of the following procedure: A contract confirmation letter shall be sent by the County to the Provider Agency prior to the effective date of the contract. That confirmation shall include the Contract term and the negotiated Contract reimbursable ceiling. The confirmation letter shall be signed by the authorized Provider Agency signatory and returned to the office of Finance and Accounting.

The Contract shall not be valid or binding and no payment(s) will be approved until the Office of Finance and Accounting is in receipt of a properly executed confirmation letter from the provider. The Contract term and reimbursable ceiling specified in the contract confirmation letter are hereby incorporated into and made a part of this Contract.

<u>Section 5.09 Collective Bargaining.</u> State and federal law allow employees to organize themselves into a collective bargaining unit.

Funds provided under this Contract shall not be utilized to abridge the rights of employees to organize themselves into a collective bargaining organization or preclude them from negotiating with Provider Agency management.

<u>Section 5.10 Independent Employer Status.</u> Employees of Provider Agencies that Contract with the County are employees of the Provider Agency, not the County.

In accordance with the National Labor Relations Act, 29 U.S.C.A. 152(2) and State law, <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 34:13A-1 <u>et seq.</u>, Provider Agencies are independent, private employers with all the rights and obligations of such, and are not political subdivisions of the County.

As Such, the Provider Agency acknowledges that it is an independent contractor, providing services to the County, typically through a contract-for-services agreement. As independent contractors, Provider Agencies are responsible for the organization's overall functions which include the overseeing and monitoring of its operations, establishing the salary and benefit levels of its employees, and handling all personnel matters as the employer of its workers.

The Provider Agency acknowledges its relationship with its employees as that of employer. While the County has an adjunct role with Provider Agencies through regulatory oversight and ensuring contractual performance, the Provider understands that the County is not the employer of a Provider Agency's employees.

The Provider Agency further acknowledges that while the County reimburses Provider Agencies for all allowable costs under the contract, this funding mechanism does not translate into the County being responsible for any of the elements of any collective bargaining agreements into which Provider Agencies may enter. Moreover, each Provider Agency understands that it is responsible for funding its own programs and is not limited to the amount of funding provided by the County, and, in fact, is encouraged to solicit non-County/non-State sources of funding, whenever possible.

AGENCY OVERVIEW: Briefly (in one page) describe the philosophy/mission/purpose of the agency itself. Include information on its incorporation date and status.

Sussex County Skylands Ride (SCSR), formerly Sussex County Transit, was established in 1981 as a Federal Highway Demonstration Project to offer rural public transportation to the residents of the County. SCSR is a Division of Sussex County government. Over the past 31 years, SCSR has evolved into a multi-faceted operation serving a number of programs and public sectors. The service began with two buses and four staff members and has grown to some 25 fleet vehicles and 30 staff. Over 117,000 rides are provided annually. Skylands Ride is the primary transportation provider for the County of Sussex, in fact it is the only viable local public and paratransit transportation service in the County.

Skylands Ride's motto is "Serving Sussex County with Pride." Transportation is reliable, customer friendly and service oriented. SCSR service is divided into two major categories: public deviated fixed route (Skylands Connect) and paratransit or demand response transit (Skylands Request). Skylands Connect, formerly the Loop, provides public bus service to the towns of Franklin, Hamburg, Hampton, Hardyston, Lafayette, Newton, Ogdensburg, Sparta, Sussex and Wantage. The Connect services the county hospitals, many doctors and medical facilities, major shopping areas, the YMCA, Sussex Wantage Library, Mill Street high-rise, Andover Nursing Home, Sussex County Community College and other popular locations. A service called New Freedom is available to connect with trains and buses at the Netcong corridor to the train stations. Passengers may schedule a pick-up to come into Sussex County from Netcong or travel from Sussex County to Netcong. Skylands Request and New Freedom trips must be booked 48 hours in advance.

These services are operated over the course of a 14 hour day from 5:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, with the exception of the County holidays. With the addition of Grant-in-Aid funding, Skylands Ride provides Saturday service from 8:20 a.m. to 3:40 p.m.

I. <u>DOCUMENTATION OF NEED</u>: In no more than one page, provide a narrative description of the need that is being addressed by the proposed program as outlined in the Sussex County Needs Assessment, and/or other applicable data.

Lack of affordable transportation inhibits the ability of Sussex County residents to grocery shop, attend physical and mental health appointments, visit local hospitals, and fully participate in the life of their community. Except for the service provided by Skylands Ride which is funded through this program, there is currently no other affordable weekend or regular service to Bridgeway Rehabilitation Services. For example, according to the Skylands Ride Fare Study in 2014 round trip cab fare from Newton to Sparta was \$70.00.

The Sussex County Human Services Needs Assessment has found adequate transportation the second highest service gap in Sussex County. NJ Transit designed a New Jersey Statewide, County and Community Transportation Planning Questionnaire designed to gather information about resources and needs that are specific to each county. The results of this questionnaire indicated that the major unmet needs identified through this process in Sussex County included lack of enough weekend service, lack of accessible services for people with disabilities and the high cost of available transportation services such as taxi or private shuttle.

The need for expanded transportation services on the weekend was confirmed through the October 2014 Veteran's On-Board Survey, the 2015 On-Board Survey and the 2015 Job Access Reverse Commute On-Board Survey. Respondents stated that weekend and evening public transportation services were serious service gaps.

Each year the Sussex County Transportation Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) holds four meetings and one public hearing. At the most recent public hearing held on July 16, 2015, testimony indicated the need for expanded transportation services on weekends and evenings, and transportation to access to mental health services were the major concerns. The testimony echoed residents' comments at every CAC meeting for the last five years, as well as the last five CAC Public Hearings.

The Sussex County Human Services Coordinated Transportation Plan was created in 2007 and has been updated annually under the guidelines of the Federal United we Ride initiative. The plan was created and updated using survey tools. Each year the Plan survey results rank the need for affordable transportation on weekends and evenings, and to mental health services as number one and two respectively. Studies conducted by Bridgeway and the Sussex County Senior Services indicate transportation as a foremost service gap.

b. Rationale for selecting this segment of the population.

The Sussex County Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan indicates that the biggest challenge and barrier for County residents is lack of public transportation, especially on evenings and weekends. The Sussex County 2014 Veteran's On-board Survey Report indicates that the number one need is an increase in public transportation. The Sussex County Skylands Ride 2014 Annual On-Board Survey Report and the 2015 Job Access Reverse Commute On-Board Survey Report indicates that the reliance upon public bus service and need for it have grown compared to both the 2010 and 2008 surveys. The 2015 Human Services Needs Assessment indicates the number two need is to expand the current public transportation system to include weekends, and for the past five years Transit Citizen Advisory Committee Public Hearing participants from the public indicated the need to expand public bus service as well as transportation to mental health services such as Bridgeway and NewBridge. The North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority (NJTPA) 2015 Regional Plan for Sustainable Development called public transportation a top priority in Sussex County.

Bridgeway Rehabilitation Services moved its location to Newton in 2012. SCSR transports numerous passengers to the new location. In addition, the 2015 Human Services Needs Assessment indicates there is a need to expand public transportation availability to mental health services.

- c. Describe geographic service area for this program.
 - Bus service is provided to Franklin, Hampton, Hamburg, Hardyston, Newton, Ogdensburg, Sparta, Sussex and Wantage. The bus follows the Connect schedule that was developed by Nelson Nygaard, an international leader in transportation planning. Planners used results from extensive public surveys, public hearing testimonies, demographic information, NJ Transit Northern County Transportation Survey, United we Ride Plan, and the Sussex County Transportation Plan. The bus stops at all major shopping areas, the YMCA, hospitals, medical centers, mental health services, Andover Nursing Home, and Sussex County Community College, as well as several other popular stops. Please see bus schedules on page 25 and 26 for further edification. Daily bus service to Bridgeway Rehabilitation Services is also available Bridgeway Rehabilitation Services are also during weekdays. accessible to the public living in the Route 206 corridor in Andover and Byram by using the existing New Freedom service.

There are no eligibility criteria. Bus service is available to all Sussex County citizens.

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- e. Describe capability of this project to meet the cultural needs of clients to be served.
 - Skylands Ride, formerly known as Sussex County Transit, has served the Sussex County community for over 34 years in a culturally sensitive and effective manner.
- f. Describe the coordinating benefits and/or services among providers, or how the services to be supplied will interface and interact with other providers to provide a cohesive, non-duplicating array of services to the target population. How will these efforts improve the cost or effectiveness of the program? There is no other public transportation on Saturdays or weekdays to the new Bridgeway Rehabilitation Services location and NewBridge Services. Public bus service is an inexpensive means of transportation. The bus route is crafted to provide transportation service to many of the County's community based agencies, hospitals, medical parks and mental health services. Sussex County Skylands Ride is the only viable local public transportation in Sussex County.

SCSR will deviate from its route up to ¾ mile to transport if a request is made 24 hours in advance and the bus can turn around in the vicinity of the pick-up. SCSR is fully accessible to residents with a disability and is able to transport wheelchair bound passengers.

 Access is available to residents who can board the bus within the scheduled route area, or within ³/₄ mile if a route deviation is requested.

SCSR has a robust history of safely, reliably and sensitively serving residents with disabilities through its paratransit and public bus services. SCSR strictly adheres to all ADA requirements. Service animals and personal companions are welcomed on the bus. SCSR is able to transport wheelchair bound passengers.

SCSR has provided safe and reliable transportation services to Sussex County residents for over 34 years. The program is funded through the Federal Transportation Administration, NJ Transit and local funding. SCSR was named New Jersey Community Transportation Agency of the Year because of its excellence in service and its progressive transportation policies. NJ Transit submitted Skylands Ride to the National Community Transportation Center as a candidate for National System of the Year.

b. Identify supervision, staff, and their respective functions to implement this program.

Director – Management and oversight.

Program Coordinator – Day to day operations management.

Fiscal Officer - Accounting and reporting.

Omnibus Supervisors – Supervise Omnibus Operators, assist the public and take reservations.

Scheduler - Schedules paratransit vehicle pick-ups and drop-offs.

Principal Clerk Typist – Takes reservations, answers questions from the public, prepares billing invoices and provides informational assistance to Omnibus Operators as needed.

Omnibus Operators - Responsible for safe and reliable transport.

c. Describe policy for staff growth and development.

Staff are provided Hazardous Materials, Fire Safety, Defensive Driving, Right to Know, Wheel Chair Securement, and PASS (Passenger Assistance Service and Safety) training on a regular basis. All Omnibus Operators are drug and alcohol tested on a random basis and must submit a physician's certification of fitness to drive every three years.

IV. PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION:

a. Summarize the staffing and overall program implementation activities.

Saturday service is comprised of three Omnibus Operators to provide regular north and southbound service as well as sufficient time for shopping, recreation and medical trips. Daily service to Bridgeway Rehabilitation Services is provided by two Omnibus Operators. The service was implemented in 2013 through community outreach. This was accomplished through the Director, Program Coordinator and Omnibus Supervisors. The Outreach activities were in-kind services. Outreach occurred through the local media, County website, community based agencies, food pantries and handouts at the major shopping centers throughout the County. Program management and oversight have been ongoing since inception.

b. Provide accompanied time frames in narrative or grid format for program activities
 The program will operate January 2, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

Saturday service will be available every Saturday from 8:20 a.m. to 3:40 p.m. Service to Bridgeway Rehabilitation Services will be available Monday through Saturday. The bus will not operate on County holidays.

The Office operates two routes connecting the towns in the central part of the County. Public demand response transportation is available in certain municipalities which have contracted with the Office of Transit Skylands Ride and provides feeder service to the Netcong transit hub for passengers to connect with NJ TRANSIT trains and buses.

Paratransit service is provided both in and out-of-County for senior citizens, people with disabilities, and veterans. In-County services are available for local errands, including medical appointments, shopping, nutrition, community services, banking, education and training, and employment. Out-of-County services are limited to non-emergency medical appointments.

Public Outreach Activities

1. Describe special events, presentations, conferences, articles, news coverage, reports or any other forms of media and if applicable, a copy of that coverage the County intends on participating in 2017. Include recent surveys and survey results.

Skylands Ride actively participates in all senior events including Sussex County College Senior Day, the State Fair, Senior Day at Selective Insurance, Senior Presidents Club and the Senior Care Givers Expo. Skylands Ride has a booth at the annual State Fair held in August. Skylands Ride partners with the Sussex County Aging and Disability Resource Connection Program to distribute marketing materials to seniors and persons with disabilities in their office and at their events. Skylands Ride is also planning on being available at the Project Community Connect event, scheduled for the fall of 2017, which is organized through the Sussex County Department of Human Services. This event is a one-stop shop for human services and health information for community members featuring information and education on foreclosure intervention, housing, child care assistance, transportation, mental health, among many other topics. Attendance for this event is usually between 100-150 people, if not more, as advertising efforts increase. Staff from Skylands Ride will be available to help community members navigate the transportation system here in Sussex County including assistance properly understanding the bus schedules.

2. Provide a list of locations of where transportation marketing materials are distributed in the service area, how often are they distributed?

All public outreach and marketing materials are available year-round. Marketing material and public outreach are publicized on radio and cable TV, in newspapers, county and municipal offices, human service agencies, as well as county libraries. Information and marketing materials are also shared and distributed at the monthly meetings of the Sussex County Human Services Advisory Committee, Sussex County Disability Advisory Council (DSAC), Sussex County Council of Service Agencies (CSA), Sussex County Council on Senior Services (which is the County's ADRC serving seniors and persons with disabilities), at which representatives from almost all community based organizations operating in the County are in attendance. These meetings occur on a monthly basis, with the exception of July or August. A representative from Sussex County Skylands Ride attends all meetings and provides monthly updates to agency representatives on upcoming meetings, changes in services as well as periodic formal presentations and marketing materials about available services so that all agencies will have current information on transportation for their clients.

Marketing Materials are also distributed at a booth located at the Sussex County Farm and Horse Show/State Fair, senior events at the Sussex County Farm and Horse Show/State Fair, County College of Sussex, Caregivers Coalition, Senior Day at Selective Risk Insurance, take control of your health classes, back to school day, Project Community Connect events and "services day" at Project Self Sufficiency.

Transportation services in Sussex County will be also be advertised through the new Human Services Directory which is now available on the Sussex County website. There are currently over 900 entries in the area of human services, including transportation. There are advertising efforts currently taking place to make sure that the community is aware of this resource, including targeting the twenty-four municipalities in Sussex County.

The Sussex County Transportation Citizens Advisory Board (SCTCAC) includes a member for Sussex County ARC (SCARC), a representative from DAWN and liaison from the County's Senior and Disabled Services. Conduits for information, these representatives share marketing materials and transportation information with their agency members and provide a unique perspective for the SCTCAC.

3. In planning public transportation services, private sector providers must be given an opportunity to express their views. How does the subrecipient allow for input on services from private operators in the service area?

The Sussex County Citizens Advisory Committee holds an Annual Public Hearing for SCDRTAP and S5311 contracts which encourages input from private operators and the public. A legal notice is placed in the paper 30 days prior to the public hearing. The local radio stations broadcast the hearing through public service announcements. The County Clerk and Clerk of the Board post a notice of the hearing. The Municipal Clerks in all Sussex towns are asked to post the hearing notice. Bus companies operating in Sussex are sent a letter notifying them of the public hearing. Advisory councils and committees under the County of Sussex as well as community committees are sent notifications in order to distribute to their agency staff, clients, families and community members.

ABOUT SUSSEX COUNTY SKYLANDS RIDE

Sussex County Skylands Ride was established in 1981 as a Federal Highway Demonstration Project to offer rural public transportation to the residents of the County. Over the years SCSR has evolved into a multi -faceted operation serving a number of programs and public sectors. The service began with two buses and four staff members and has grown to some 25 fleet ve-hicles and 30 staff. Over 120,000 rides are provided

SCSR service is divided into two major categories; public deviated fixed route (Skylands Connect) and para-transit or demand response transit. (Skylands Request). A new service called New Freedom is available to connect with trains and buses at the Netcong transit hub. The New Freedom feeder service runs from Newton down the Route 206 corridor to the train station. Passengers may schedule a pick-up to come into Sussex County from Netcong or travel from Sussex County to Netcong. Trips must be booked 48 hours in advance.

These services are operated over the course of a 14 hour day from 5a.m. to 7p.m., Monday through Friday, with the exception of the County holidays listed below.



Carol Novrit called the meeting to order at 1:19 p.m., followed by the salute to the flag, roll call and reading of the Sunshine Law.

Public Comments Related to Agenda Items: None.

Minutes – 3/22/16: The minutes were approved as presented.

Correspondence: None.

Director's Report: Carol Novrit commended Freeholder Graham and Assemblywoman Phoebus for their strong support of transit. Carol reported that last month she had the opportunity to attend the Community Transportation Association of America Conference. Carol added that she is also the New Jersey state delegate for this association. It was an excellent conference which consisted of a National Roadeo and workshops geared toward improving communications, bus services and performance. There was also a huge expo displaying the latest technology for buses. Skylands Ride Omnibus Operator Douglas Maull placed fourth in the NJ COST State Roadeo in April.

Program Coordinator's Report: John Jackson reported that to date Skylands Ride has provided over 46,434 public and paratransit trips and 1,345 trips on the Skylands Connect Saturday service. The NJTPA, with the assistance of Tom Drabic, has been requested to assist Skylands Ride with translating its schedule into a Spanish version which should be completed in the near future. Skylands Ride anticipates receiving several replacement vehicles from NJ Transit within the next few months.

NJ Transit Report: Please see attached report from Isabel Hernandez.

State CAC Report: Robert Panzer was not in attendance; therefore, no updates are available at this time.

Senior Services: Lorraine Hentz reported that Senior Services recently held its annual event in honor of Older American's Month. This year, Senior Services implemented a Memorandum of Understanding with SCCC for the spring semester to conduct community education and service programming classes. The program was held once a month for each month and went extremely well. They will continue the program in the fall semester and anticipate offering two programs each month with a senior curriculum of varying programs and services. Senior Services completed its monitoring of Older Americans Act programs. All monitoring went well.

Community Services: Elizabeth Larsen reported that Project Community Connect will be held in the gymnasium at Sussex County Community College from 12:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. on the 19th of October. This is an event planned through the Human Services Advisory Council. The focus will be on enrollment this year in addition to information and referral. Public Health Nursing will be on site to provide flu shots and ACA volunteers will be available to assist with health insurance enrollment. Information will be available to the public by topic. Lunch and dinner will be provided by Applebee's. The Homeless Coordination elected to conduct two Homeless Point in Time surveys this year; one was completed in January and the other will take place in July. The two surveys will be compared to determine if there is a difference in the homeless count during summer versus the winter.

Transportation: Please see attached report from Tom Drabic.

Old Business: None.

New Business: Carol announced that although the 2017 SCDRTAP/Section 5311 Application has not been released yet, the services currently provided by Skylands Ride will remain the same as what had been outlined in last year's application. However, there may be fewer rides given due to funding cuts. The committee voted on the service that will be provided through the application. The first motion to approve the application was made by Joseph Lashendock and the second motion was made by Lorraine Hentz, followed by unanimous Committee approval.

Public Comment Not Related to Agenda Items: Assemblywoman Phoebus announced that a bill was recently released concerning LogistiCare. The bill basically states that the company who is awarded the contract to provide transportation services to Medicaid recipients in the State of New Jersey must provide wheelchair lifts and restraints that work as well as professional drivers who have received customer service training. The Human Services Hearing was open for comments and organizations and non-profits were in attendance from across the state. Assemblywoman Phoebus reflected upon a time when she was a Freeholder and had requested that passengers be surveyed in regard to the complaints about LogistiCare. The results of these surveys were then forwarded to Trenton. Three other counties had also taken the same action. This speaks to the fact that the issues with LogistiCare are not just rural in nature but actually statewide. The main headquarters of LogistiCare are based in Atlanta, Georgia and there seems to be no effective manner to relay all of the complaints. LogistiCare was fined close to a half million dollars as a result of the surveys that were presented.

The bill was released from Human Services and was unanimously approved during the last billing session for the Assembly. The next step is to see if it can pass through the Senate with a companion bill. This will help to ensure that the company who services the state for the next five years will supply our fragile population with better service and well maintained vehicles.

Assemblywoman Phoebus expressed a desire to place a shelter at the Trinity Street bus stop as there is currently no protection for passengers who await the bus. Carol stated that we have been in contact with the Town of Newton and NJ Transit. NJ Transit will provide the shelter at no cost if the town maintains it; however, the town has yet to respond. Assemblywoman Phoebus asked Freeholder Director Graham if he could advocate for this project.

Assemblywoman Phoebus recalled a request made during a previous meeting to place emblems on the front of the buses so county transit vehicles can be easily identified. Assemblywoman Phoebus asked if there is it would be possible to place something on the vehicles without a great cost. John Jackson advised he would have County seals placed on the front of the vehicles and pursue placing other identification on the front of the buses.

The meeting adjourned at 1:56 p.m. The next scheduled meeting will be held in the Freeholder Meeting Room at the Sussex County Administration Center on Tuesday, October 11, 2016, at 1:00 p.m.

The attached Special Warranty and the procedures incorporated therein represent he understandings of the Department of Labor and the Department of Transportation with respect to the formula Grant Program for Areas Other Than Urbanized Areas (C.F.R. U.S.C. Section 5311)

The Department of Transportation will make this Special Warranty a part of the contract of assistance between the U. S. Department of Transportation and each state agency designated to receive and administer funds under Section 5311 of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended.

The Secretary of Labor has found that the terms and conditions of the Special Warranty meet the requirements of Section 5333(b) of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended. Accordingly, the Secretary of Labor hereby makes the certification that inclusion of these terms and conditions in formula grant contract for small urban and rural program grants meets the requirements of Section 5311 of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964, as amended.

A. General Application

The Public Body (A) agrees that, in the absence of waiver by the Department of Labor, the terms and conditions of this warranty, as set forth below, shall apply for the protection of the transportation related employees of any employer providing transportation services assisted by the Project (Recipient), and the transportation related employees of any other surface public transportation providers in the transportation service area of the project.

The Public Body shall provide to the Department of Labor and maintain at all times during the Project an accurate, up-to-date listing of all existing transportation providers which are eligible Recipients of transportation assistance funded by the Project, in the transportation service area of the Project, and any labor organizations representing the employees of such providers.

Certification by the Public Body to the Department of Labor that the designated Recipients have indicated in writing acceptance of the terms and conditions of the warranty arrangement will be sufficient to permit the flow of Section 5311 funding in the absence of a finding of non-compliance by the Department of Labor.

B. Standard Terms and Conditions

The Project shall be carried out in such a manner and upon such terms and conditions as will not adversely affect employees of the Recipient and of any other surface public transportation provider in the transportation service area of the Project. It shall be an obligation of the Recipient and any other legally responsible party designated by the Public Body to assure that any and all transportation services assisted by the Project are contracted for and operated in such a manner that they do not impair the rights and interest of affected employees. The term a Project, as used herein, shall not be limited to the particular facility, service, or operation assisted by Federal funds, but shall include any changes, whether organizational, operational, technological, or otherwise, which are a result of the assistance provided. The phrase "as a result of the Project," shall when used in this arrangement, include events related to the Project occurring in anticipation of, during, and subsequent to the Project and any program of efficiencies or economies related thereto; provided, however, that volume rises and falls of business, or changes in volume and character of employment brought about by causes other than the Project (including any economies or efficiencies unrelated to the Project) are not within the purview of this arrangement.

An employee covered by this arrangement, who is not dismissed, displaced or otherwise worsened in his position with regard to his employment as a result of the Project, but who is dismissed, displaced or otherwise worsened solely because of the total or partial termination of the Project, discontinuance of Project services, or exhaustion of Project funding shall not be deemed eligible for a dismissal or displacement allowance within the meaning of paragraphs (6) and (7) of the Model agreement or applicable provisions of substitute comparable arrangements.

- (a) Where employees of a Recipient are represented for collective bargaining purposes, all Project services provided by that Recipient shall be provided under an in accordance with any collective bargaining agreement applicable to such employees which is then in effect.
- (b) The Recipient or legally responsible party shall provide to all affected employees sixty (60) days notice of intended actions which may result in displacements or dismissal or rearrangements of the working forces. In the case of employees represent by a union, such notice shall be provided by certified mail through their representatives. The notice shall contain a full and adequate statement of the proposed changes, and an estimate of the number of employees affected by the intended changes, and the number and classifications of any jobs in the Recipient=s employment available to be filled by such affected employees
- (c) The procedures of this subparagraph shall apply to cases where notices involve employees represented by a union for collective bargaining purposes. At the request of either the Recipient or the representatives of such employees' negotiations for the purposes of reaching agreement with respect to the application of the terms and conditions of this arrangement shall commence immediately. If no agreement is reached within twenty (20) days from the commencement of negotiations, any party to the dispute may submit the paragraph (4) of this warranty. The foregoing procedures shall be complied with and carried out prior to the institution of the intended action.

For the purpose of providing the statutory required protections including those specifically mandated by Section 5333(b) of the Act, the Public Body will assure as a condition of the release of funds that the Recipient agrees to be bound by the terms and conditions of the National (Model) Section 5333(b) Agreement executed July 23, 1975, identified below², provided that other comparable agreements may be substituted therefore, if approved by the Secretary of Labor and certified for inclusion in these conditions.

Any dispute or controversy arising regarding the application, interpretation, or enforcement of any of the provisions of this arrangement which cannot be settled by and between the parties at interest within thirty (3) days after the dispute or controversy first arises, may be referred by any such party to any final and binding disputes settlement procedure acceptable to the parties, or in the event they cannot agree upon such procedure, to the Department of Labor or an impartial third party designated by the Department of Labor for final and binding determination. The compensation and expenses of the impartial third party, and any other jointly incurred expenses shall be borne equally by the parties to the proceeding and all other expenses shall be paid by the party incurring them.

In the event of any dispute as to whether or not a particular employee was affected by the Project, it shall be his obligation to identify the Project and specify the pertinent facts of the Project relied upon. It shall then be the burden of either the Recipient or other party legally responsible for the application of these conditions to prove that factors other than the Project affected the employees. The claiming employee shall prevail if it is established that the Project had an effect upon the employee even if other factors may also have affected the employee.

The Recipient or other legally responsible party designated by the Public Body will be financially responsible for the application of these conditions and will make the necessary arrangements so that any employee covered by these arrangements, or the union representative of such employee, may file claim of violation of these arrangements with the Recipient within sixty (60) days of the date he is terminated or laid off as a result of the Project, or within eighteen (5311) months of the date his position with respect to his employment is otherwise worsened as a result of the Project. In the latter case, if the events giving rise to the claim have occurred over an extended period, the 18-month limitation shall be measured from the last such event. No benefits shall be payable for any period prior to six (6) months from the date of the filing of any claim.

Nothing in this arrangement shall be construed as depriving any employee of any rights or benefits which such employee may have under existing employment or collective bargaining agreements, nor shall this arrangement be deemed a waiver of any rights of any union or of any represented

employee derived from any other agreement or provision of federal, state or local law.

In the event any employee covered by these arrangements is terminated or laid off as a result of the Project, he shall be granted priority of employment or reemployment to fill any vacant position within the control of the Recipient for which he is, or by training or retraining within a reasonable period can become qualified. In the event training or retraining is required by such employment or reemployment, the Recipient or other legally responsible party designated by the Public Body shall provide, or provide for, such training or retraining at no cost to the employee.

The Recipient will post, in a prominent and accessible place, a notice stating that the Recipient has received federal assistance under the Urban Mass Transportation Act and has agreed to comply with the provisions of Section 5333(b) of the Act. This notice shall also specify the terms and conditions set forth herein for the protection of employees. The Recipient shall maintain and keep on file all relevant books and records in sufficient details as to provide the basic information necessary to the proper application, administration, and enforcement of these arrangements and to the proper determination of any claims arising thereunder.

Any labor organization which is the collective bargaining representative of employees covered by these arrangements, may become a party to these arrangements by serving written notice of its desire to do so upon the Recipient and the Department of Labor. In the event of any disagreement that such labor organization represents covered employees, or is otherwise eligible to become a party to these arrangements, as applied to the Project, the dispute as to whether such organization shall participate shall be determined by the Secretary of Labor.

In the event the Project is approved for assistance under the Act, the foregoing terms and conditions shall be made part of the contract of assistance between the federal government and the Public Body or Recipient of federal funds; provided, however, that this arrangement shall not merge into the contract of assistance, but shall be independently binding and enforceable by and upon the parties thereto, and by any covered employee or his representative, in accordance with it terms, nor shall any other employee protective agreement merge into this arrangement, but each shall be independently binding and enforceable by and upon the parties thereto, in accordance with its terms.

C. Waiver

As a part of the grant approval process, either the recipient or other legally responsible party designated by the Public Body may in writing seek from the Secretary of Labor a waiver of the statutory required protections. The Secretary will waive these protections in cases, where at the time of the requested waivers, the Secretary determines that there are no employees of the Recipient or of any other surface public transportation providers in the transportation services area who could be potentially affected by the Project. A 30-day notice of proposed waiver will be given by the Department of Labor and in the absence of timely objection; the waiver will become final at the end of the 30-day notice period. In the event of timely objection, the Department of Labor will review the matter and determine whether a waiver shall be granted. In the absence of waiver, these protections shall apply to the Project.

SECTION VIII FTA SECTION 5311 INNOVATION GRANT

Purpose

The FTA Section 5311 Innovation Grant is a designation of a portion of unused **funding allocated to Section 5311 eligible counties** which is made available to these counties on a competitive application basis. The objective is to provide funding to promote integration of community transit services and NJ Transit bus and rail services in rural counties.

Grant Qualification Criteria

Project applications must meet the following standards in order to be eligible for competitive review:

- 1. Project must provide a direct connection with an existing NJ Transit bus, private fixed route bus or rail service either within or in a contiguous county
- 2. Route must serve residential origins within the Census defined rural area
- 3. The service must consist of a **deviated fixed route service with a service frequency** of 60 minutes or less during either peak or off-peak periods
- 4. Service must be provided on a minimum of five days per week
- 5. The proposed service may be either a new service or an expansion of service span or frequency of an existing service that provides direct connections to a rail station or an established bus route at either a route endpoint or key bus stop or station.
- 6. Submit a marketing plan which includes a commitment to provide a bus timetable that includes at minimum key time-points, a map with a designation of those key time-points, pickup/drop-off points, fare information, and connecting transit bus and rail services. The proposer must also provide a plan for a timetable distribution program including key residential, commercial and employment locations served and the proposed mode of ensuring that bus timetables are supplied and available to potential customers.
- 7. Proposed service operator must demonstrate the ability to meet operating requirements including but not limited to:
 - Meeting New Jersey Motor Vehicle Commission (NJMVC) requirements for operating authority and vehicle inspections if charging a fare
 - Demonstrate a vehicle fleet sufficient to meet the peak vehicle requirement for the service with a minimum 15% spare ratio in order to ensure that the daily peak vehicle requirement is met

Funding Requirements

Funding may be used only for direct operating expenses for the provision of vehicle services including driver salary and benefits, fuel, vehicle parts and maintenance labor or the cost of contract operated service.

Funding may NOT be used to cover operating expenses including operations management, dispatch and training. It is assumed that the existing system will be able to provide these direct operating support services within the context of the existing service or through other grant funding sources.

The applicant must demonstrate the financial capability to provide the required **25%** match which must be used in combination with the NJ Transit 25% match to support half of the direct operating expenses for the proposed service. Once approved projects have been Identified Resolutions will be requested.

A maximum of \$200,000.00 (including match) will be made available to a single project.
